HUMAN TRAFFICKING PROGRAM FUNDING

Overview

The Office for Victims of Crime (OVC) administers the largest amount of federal grant funding to support services for victims of human trafficking in the United States. States, federally recognized tribes, units of local government, nonprofit organizations, and nongovernmental victim service organizations are typically eligible to apply for this funding appropriated through the [Trafficking Victims Protection Act](#). Eligibility may vary depending on the program solicitation.

OVC Human Trafficking Funding

OVC issues several different solicitations each year to [fund human trafficking programs](#). These programs provide victim-centered and trauma-informed services to victims of all forms of human trafficking; enhance interagency collaboration and extend the coordinated community response to human trafficking; and support training and technical assistance to improve responses to trafficking.

Each fall, OVC identifies which grant program solicitations will be released, offers a brief description of the solicitation, and shares the anticipated release date in a program plan. OVC solicitations are typically released each fiscal year between December and May and are posted on the [OVC website](#).

OVC Discretionary Funding

OVC awards discretionary grants each year to improve the delivery of crime victim services throughout the Nation. The [OVC Grant Award Search](#) offers information about awarded grants from 1993-present, including the award title, awardee, award number, amount, and solicitation title.
